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The Children's Health Fund and Wyeth Announce Partnership to Bring Health Care to Children

Wyeth's \$500,000 Will Help Fund CHF's Urban Health Initiative

Pearl River, N.Y., September 24, 2007 — The Children's Health Fund (CHF) and Wyeth (NYSE:WYE), one of the world's largest research-based pharmaceutical and health care products companies, today announced a partnership that will facilitate access to health care for thousands of poor and homeless children throughout the United States.

In a ceremony at Wyeth's Pearl River campus in Rockland County, Bernard Poussot, President and Chief Operating Officer of Wyeth, delivered a \$500,000 check to help fund CHF's Urban Health Initiative, a program that brings health care to children who cannot afford it and often cannot get to it. At the same time, CHF President and Co-founder Irwin Redlener, M.D., unveiled a Wyeth-sponsored Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) — a fully equipped 38-foot medical clinic on wheels. It is part of CHF's fleet of more than 30 MMUs that deliver health care to children in 21 locations in 13 states and Washington, D.C.

CHF, a not-for-profit organization, was launched 20 years ago by pediatrician/child advocate Dr. Redlener and singer/songwriter Paul Simon to address the health care needs of urban homeless children in New York City. Since then, CHF has expanded the scope of its clinical programs to address the diverse needs of America's medically underserved communities.

"The Children's Health Fund has been unstoppable in its mission to provide quality medical care where it is needed most," says Bernard Poussot. "Wyeth is proud to have been associated with this organization for the past 20 years and look forward to continuing our partnership through our support of the Urban Health Initiative."

Dr. Redlener adds, "Wyeth has been among the Children's Health Fund's strongest supporters, actively participating on CHF's Corporate Council for America's Children. This new funding will strengthen our mobile-based health care programs that provide

essential services to children living under very difficult urban conditions where access to medical care is extremely challenging."

Today's ceremony was held at Wyeth's Pearl River site, which is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year. More than 3,200 people work on the 550-acre site in biotech manufacturing, consumer product manufacturing, chemical and pharmaceutical research, vaccines research and global analytical development.

CHF's Urban Health Initiative provides medical and mental health care and health education for children and families living in poor and medically underserved urban areas across the country, including: Austin, Chicago, Dallas, Long Island, Los Angeles, Miami, Newark, New Orleans, Orlando, Phoenix, San Francisco and Washington, D.C. In 2006 alone, CHF's urban projects provided 116,338 health encounters in these areas to more than 38,000 patients.

Patients of these urban programs include homeless children and families; victims of domestic violence; children of the working poor; runaway and at-risk youth; and children of recent immigrants. In addition to primary health care needs, these children have higher-than-average rates of both medical and social problems, including asthma, obesity, ear infections, developmental delays and tooth decay, and as many as 60 percent are under-immunized.

The MMUs provide a *medical home* —comprehensive, continuous, culturally sensitive and family-centered care. These mobile units are fully equipped and staffed medical clinics on wheels that travel on a regular schedule to homeless shelters, community centers, schools and other outreach sites and bring a full range of health care services to medically underserved children and families. A pioneering Electronic Health Record system keeps patient information available in a mobile environment.
