

Dallas Children's Health Project



The Dallas Children's Health Project (DCHP) provides comprehensive medical care to children and adolescents through school-based health services. It also serves those who are unstably housed through the use of a mobile medical clinic. Children and families in Dallas face numerous challenges to accessing healthcare. These include poverty, lack of insurance, inadequate transportation, and a language barrier. Among the issues DCHP addresses in the children and adolescents it serves include significant levels of developmental delay or school failure; poor reading levels; family dysfunction, for example domestic violence; child abuse or neglect; mental illness; nutritional problems; and minor acute illnesses. Along with pediatric primary care services, DCHP provides dental and mental health care services.
